

 $oldsymbol{v}$ ommunication is the key to education. This is a ⁹ quote by James Bryce. Prior to looking it up I had no idea who James Bryce was. However, instead of clicking on Wikipedia, I instinctively selected the online encyclopedia. It is because of a particular educator that I can unironically say that I love encyclopedias. This educator is Ms. Murphy, my elementary school GT teacher. My very first year in the class I was the only girl. I distinctly remember the class is being called to attention using the phrase "boys and girl" because, it was funny. In some other situations being the only female student in the room could have been intimidating, but in Ms. Murphy's classroom, there was never the question that I belonged. She went out of her way to make individual connections with every student that walked through her door. For me, I remember researching Amelia Earhart in an encyclopedia, overcomplicating a Rube Goldberg machine (which you can do by the way!) and learning how to put together the perfect PowerPoint. Power-Points were a contentious subject. Contrary to what we heard in most other classes they were supposed to be comprised almost entirely of pictures. The words were supposed to be very minimal, I believe it was no more

than 10 words per slide. We were told that if all our information was on our slide, "what did the audience need us for?" We learned that by spreading out the information it could be more effectively communicated. Now Ms. Murphy is not an amazing educator just because of her PowerPoint prowess, but because of the focus on communication. By learning how to communicate to a large group, small class, or project partner, we also learned how to listen. This back and forth dialogue, that is not always spoken, was essential not only for building that strong classroom community that existed for my four years in her class, but also our ability to learn from each other. While the math, and the English, and the science you learn in the typical classroom are important, the empathy, teamwork, and resiliency you learn from others are irreplaceable. These are skills that are not easy to gain, and I'd imagine they are 10 times harder to teach, especially to a group of students who run away screaming from anything labeled a group project. This is why I am, on a daily basis, astounded by the number of educational and interpersonal skills I learned from Ms. Murphy. Her impact on her students is truly tremendous, and I would like to be first in line to acknowledge it.



She can always sense it when her student is overwhelmed by anxiety and tiredness, and she will ask us how our day is going. Sometimes, she only gets a sketchy answer and it's fine. She won't push for more; instead, she discusses the artworks or just chats a bit. If, however, she gets a thorough tale of what's happening in their life, she will take it seriously and hear them out. She never tells them what to do in a patronizing way; only considers their perspective and guides them kindly. Either way, she makes students feel that they are cared for and loved. And that is her secret to building a comforting classroom and bonding with all her students. She truly cares. In fact, many students I know consider Mrs. Gough a "second mom," and it really shows how far such bonds go. I envy those who can take her classes for four years, but one is enough to make me believe that our school will be better off with more educators like Mrs. Gough, enough to make me believe that she deserves as much recognition as I can give for her kindness, empathy and compassion. For all the positive influences you have made on my life as well as many, many others, thank you, Mrs. Gough.

Whether she meant to or not, Mrs. Zahn set the standard for how I wish to treat people. She taught me the lesson that the biggest thing you can do with your life is make a positive impact on someone else's. I will forever be grateful for the time I spent in Mrs. Zahn's class, and I can only hope to pay her kindness forward as I graduate high school and enter the next chapter of my life.







Then, I take a deep breath, press "print," and place my article into Dr. Courtney Wellmann's loving hands. "I hope it's okay," I say. Dr. Wellmann gives me a knowing smile, winks, and says, "I trust you." Her trust means everything to me. When I joined The Catamount my freshman year, I had two goals: become Editor-in-Chief and impress Dr. Wellmann. Soon, my intense ambition transformed into passion fostered by an educator who shared my love for our newspaper. At least one Wednesday night every six weeks, we trusted each other with the crushing pressure and rushing adrenaline of finishing the newspaper. There'd be stress and panic, but there'd also be plain joy, Dr. Wellmann's 80s tunes, and her buoyant laugh. There'd even be milkshakes or Chick-Fil-A fries for those of us who dared to stay until 11 p.m. As our eyelids sagged, we labored over details like pica-sized spaces between columns and accent colors in pulled quotes. to helping me share my own story. In 2020, when my father was diagnosed with an early-onset form of dementia, I wrote to process my feelings, because speaking those feelings aloud was still too painful. When I decided to submit "Peach Pie" to the New York Times contest, I knew I needed help revising. Who could I trust with such a precious story? Dr. Wellmann was the first and only person that came to mind. She was the first to read "Peach Pie." When I handed her a freshly-printed copy of my narrative, I trusted her as a writer, an educator, my second mother, and a daughter who understands the pain of mourning a parent. But most importantly, I trusted her as a storyteller-someone who understands the nuances of well-placed adjectives, the pride I take in my work, and how stories heal us. Long after "Peach Pie," she has continued to cherish my story and offer her support. Dr. Wellmann: Thank you for everything. Thank you for accepting freshman-Elisabeth onto the Catamount, an act that would fill her high school career with the happiest of memories. Thank you for teaching me to trust in my abilities. Thank you for accepting all of my quirks, for providing me with a safe place to grow, and for transforming me from a shy writer to an outspoken storyteller. Thank you for teaching me to tell the stories of our school, and for gracefully allowing me to trust you with my own.






