You'd think the task of choosing just one teacher to recognize for the impact on your life would be a daunting one, but my choice was clear immediately. Many of my teachers have impacted my life in some way -- and for all of them I am grateful-- but none truly as deeply as Mr. Landmann. The first day of 3rd grade was particularly nerve wracking; I'd never been in a different class than my sisters, and just the thought of being alone for an entire school day made my blood run cold. As I entered Mr. Landmann's classroom, wonder replaced my fear. Things I've come to refer to as "weapons of mass education" filled the room; photographs, maps, and other memorabilia lined the walls, cases full of books reached the ceiling, figurines and models sat proudly on counters and shelves, watching over the room and its inhabitants. These tools, however, were just nice to look at or fun to hold until Mr. Landmann brought them to life in a lesson. Never before had I been genuinely interested in a school day's subject matter. Never before had I been able to ramble on and on about all the amazing knowledgel'dobtainedwhenaskedthesimplequestion of "how was school today?" until my face went blue. My fondest memories of Mr. Landmann's class are,

like many of his former students, the lectures he gave. Once a week, all of the 3rd graders gathered in the pod and sat on the floor, clipboards at the ready, eagerly awaiting whatever new topic we were to cover that day. Of these, my favorite lecture topic we discussed was Peter Carl Fabergé and the beautifully ornate eggs he crafted. Frankly, I don't have any particularly strong opinions regarding Fabergé or his eggs, but I still look back on this lesson warmly. You'd think a nine-year-old would protest learning about "some guy and his eggs," as a friend of mine lovingly put it, but I never did. Mr. Landmann was able to make just about anything interesting. Each lesson was taught with such passion and care that students couldn't help but listen attentively as if we were being told a story. It was evident in his ability to keep us all so engaged that Mr. Landmann truly had a gift. Though I may have forgotten some historical events or language arts skills we covered, I will never forget Mr. Landmann or his love for teaching. When I first decided that I wanted to go into education, I looked back on my time in his class, and I set that as a goal for myself. If one day I can teach with even half of the dedication and talent of Mr. Landmann, I would be beyond successful.

The fondest memories of my education come to mind when I think of Mrs. Amestoy. I had the pleasure of learning about theater arts while I was in fifth grade at Oakwood Intermediate School. Before I started her class, I had always known that I had an interest in musical theater and acting. My family and I would always enjoy watching musical comedies together, but that was about the extent of my knowledge of the Hollywood world. Mrs. Amestoy introduced me to the universe of the fine arts and showed me depths that I never knew existed. She took my interest in musical theater and turned it into a passion. The next year, sixth grade, I begged my parents to enroll me in a local theater troupe because I longed to be in that environment more. When I would perform, it felt like I was right back in Mrs. Amestoy's class; learning about how to properly "cheat-out" on stage and the importance of annunciation. My freshman year of high school, years after I had taken her class, I excitedly signed up for our school's musical, still remembering the many lessons she had taught me. I have participated in Consol's annual musical and have been a member of the AMCHS Choir for my entire high school career, and I truly believe that is because of Mrs. Amestoy's wisdom that I frequently fall back on. If I ever found myself taking rehearsal a little bit too seriously, I would remind myself of her words, and how she taught us that performing was supposed to be a fun, gratifying experience meant for us to cherish. Whenever the musical Singing in the Rain is referenced, I am

immediately reminded of Mrs. Amestoy. Studying that film in her class was, by far, my favorite topic that we discussed. She taught us endless behind-the-scenes "fun facts," but also extremely educational information about the technique of musicals in Hollywood. It also helped that my 11-yearold brain simply fell in love with the upbeat music about friendships and romance. My family can attest to the Singing in the Rain obsession that I went through following those lessons. I often came racing home to share all of the exciting things I learned that day, as well as constantly demanding that we watch the movie hundreds of times together. While Mrs. Amestoy taught me practical lessons about the theater world, there is another lesson that I keep close to my heart: to always project your voice, even when you are not on stage; in fact, especially when you are not on stage. She taught us to make ourselves heard. Not only in the literal sense, as an actor would do when they want the very top row of the mezzanine to hear them, but also as students. Students who have opinions. Students who want to make a difference. She taughtustospeakourminds, tostandup forwhatwebelievein. We weren't tested on that lesson. We weren't given a pop quiz and a grade indicative of our intelligence regarding the importance of speaking our minds, and it wouldn't be found in any school curriculum. However, I find it much more valuable than any other educational exercise I have received thus far. I thank Mrs. Amestoy deeply for touching my mind and my heart, even as a young fifth grader, and for influencing me to be the student that I am today.







From the very beginning he trusted me with new responsibilities, teaching me how to communicate effectively, how to plan ahead, and how to be able to pivot when things don't go as planned. From having input on our training to actually holding and leading practices when Coach was gone, I grew from each and every experience

Coach Martin would have constructive criticism which would help us be better next time. This faith shone in the most impactful thing Coach did for me: he believed in me even when I did not believe in myself. Having been injured for the majority of my senior cross country season, I felt unprepared to step into one of the seven varsity spots for our district meet having only recovered a few weeks prior; however, Coach Martin never doubted me. And at our district meet, I placed 5th on our team, scoring points for our varsity team for the first time in my career and boosting us into 2nd place, qualifying us for the regional meet. Mr. Ireland frequently began class by sharing stories of his weekend, his running adventures, or his dog Frankie, finding more ways to connect with his students. While it probably wasn't much to him, I enjoyed his stories more than I could ever express, since it made a teacher truly feel like a friend. When I lost my own friends, Mr. Ireland noticed and talked to me about it. When I felt miserable all day, Mr. Ireland took one look at me and told me to go to the nurse. When I did well on an assignment, Mr. Ireland never failed to give a compliment. He set the standard of what I wanted a teacher to be. Even after all this time, I am so incredibly grateful for the year I had him as my teacher. He made such an impact that I knew, without a doubt, he was the only teacher I wanted to honor. He was the one teacher I wanted to see one last time before I graduated. He's the teacher students remember forever, and I know for a fact, I will.




